A reflection on 20 years of medical missionary work.

Reflections on 17 years of Medical Mission Experiences

I signed up for my first Helping Hands Medical Mission in 1998 after hearing Lupita Assad speak at the Youth and Family Encounter in Indianapolis. Not only did I sign up, I signed up my wife (a nurse) and our teenage daughter as well.

I have attended 17 medical missions with Helping Hands: 2 to Mexico and 15 to El Salvador. The experiences began as an opportunity for our family to share time together as we provided care to the people of the third world and grew in our Catholic faith. I can confidently say that with every mission experience, our family returned home with a renewed appreciation of the gifts and blessings that God had given us. Our lives were touched by those who we served, people who may have been poor in the eyes of the world but rich in the eyes of God. Our daughter would go on to become a Diplomate in the US Foreign Service, and I believe that the medical mission experiences had a profound effect on her choosing this career.

Every mission team is unique, and the Holy Spirit seems to know what we will need each year. However, no matter how well you plan, there will always be challenges and surprises that test a team's faith, will, and creativity: floods, earthquakes, lost supplies, patients coming to you on the verge of death, personal stories of unbelievable pain and suffering. And yet, He always seemed to give us answers to those prayers when we could not find the way.

The memories that stand out to me as most special are the faith filled, gracious people of El Salvador, the incredible team of El Salvador Regnum Christi members that support us (I call them my family in El Salvador), the great priests that have led our teams over the years, and finally, the experience of seeing team members grow in faith and friendship over the course of the mission experience.

I will end with one of my favorite sayings from the people of El Salvador:Todo esta en las manos de Dios!

HELPING HANDS Medical Missions (HHMM) was formally established in 1996 after 3 years of developing a program for a Catholic medical mission. The idea originated in Dallas in 1991 when a priest recognized the need for Catholic medical professionals to provide health care services for the poor in rural areas of developing countries. In Holy Week of 1996 a pilot group of medical missionaries from various areas of the U.S. joined the youth missions in Michoacán, Mexico. The mission was a success with a small group (7) of medical personnel. In the fall of 1996, the first mission under the name of HELP-ING HANDS Medical Missions took place in Cotija, Mexico, with 30 participants: doctors, nurses and volunteers serving more than 500 patients and providing 91 surgeries in 5 days.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Since 1996, **HHMM** has hosted medical missions in Mexico, El Salvador, Guatemala, Brazil, Philippines, Ghana (West Africa), Venezuela and Dominican Republic and has served more than 218,600 patients. Each mission is 9-12 days long. 9-10 missions are scheduled yearly. Each mission group is comprised of approximately 15-60 participants, who volunteer their time, service, and medical supplies. Included in this group is the mission chaplain, who accompany the team as spiritual support. The mission site varies depending on the needs of certain communities and requests for help by local authorities and local clergy. The sites are visited yearly.

HELPING HANDS medical missionaries are doctors, nurses, and volunteers who come from all areas of the United States and Canada to join the host team. Participants pay their own round trip airfare, mission fee (food, housing, ground transport, and overhead) and bring supplies and medicines. Missionaries work in small clinics, hospitals, schools and churches located in rural towns where they provide free medical care for thousands of patients in need of medical attention. Services include surgeries, dental work, eye care, consultations, distribution of medications and reading glasses, follow-up of surgical patients, house calls and Natural Family Planning instruction. The participants also take part in the mission's spiritual program. This aspect of the mission includes daily prayer, mass, meditation, discussions on the teachings of the Catholic Church, and sharing the faith with the people of the town through home visits. Equipment, supplies and medications are collected year-round from various companies, hospitals and individuals in the U.S. **HHMM** is a non-profit 501 (c) (3) organization. All donations are tax deductible as permitted by law. Your participation could be time spent on a mission, spreading the word among your medical community, prayer or a monetary donation.
