History and Mission



MISSION STATEMENT

Helping Hands Medical Missions is a non-profit organization providing humanitarian aid in rural areas of developing countries, offering its volunteers a transforming experience and the opportunity to share their faith while selflessly serving the needs of others

HELPING HANDS Medical Missions (HHMM) was formally established in 1996 after 3 years of developing a program for a Catholic medical mission. The idea originated in Dallas in 1991, when a priest recognized the need for Catholic medical professionals to provide health care services for the poor in rural areas of developing countries. In Holy Week of 1996, a small pilot group of seven medical missionaries from various areas of the U.S. joined the youth missions in Michoacán, Mexico. The mission was a success. In the fall of 1996, the first official mission under the name of HELPING HANDS Medical Missions took place in Cotija, Mexico, with 30 participants: doctors, nurses and volunteers serving more than 500 patients and providing 91 surgeries in 5 days.

HELPING HANDS medical missionaries are doctors, nurses, and volunteers who come from all areas of the United States, Australia and Canada to join the host team. Participants pay their own round trip airfare, mission fee (food, housing, ground transport, and overhead) and bring supplies and medicines. Missionaries work in small clinics, hospitals, schools and churches located in rural towns where they provide free medical care for thousands of patients in need. Services include surgeries, eye care, dental care, consultations, and distribution of medications, follow-up of surgical patients, house calls and Natural Family Planning instruction. The participants also take part in the mission's spiritual program. This aspect of the mission includes daily prayer, mass, meditation, discourses on the teachings of the Catholic Church, and sharing the faith with the people of the town through home visits.

Equipment, supplies and medications are collected year-round from various companies, hospitals and individuals in the U.S. **HHMM** is a non-profit 501(c) (3) organization. All donations are tax deductible as permitted by law. Your participation could be time spent on a mission, spreading the word among

your medical community, prayer or a monetary donation.

Mission Highlights



I am happy to report that HHMM continues to grow and expand its reach to many parts of the developing world. This year, 218 missionaries participated in eight medical missions.

Our team from the Cleveland, OH area, led by Dr. Eddie Jimenez, completed another great year in the Philippines. Learning from experience of the needs in Tanauan, Philippines, Dr. Eddie organized a team of opticians to make the 8,300-mile trip. It had a wonderful impact on the people of the region. In addition to medical and dental care, the team gave away 400 pairs of reading glasses and 280 pairs of distance glasses. They also taught classes on how to take better care of one's vision.

Our team from the Madison, WI region, led by Dr. Michael Kloess, expanded their services providing water filters from EcoFiltro to the people of Ateos, El Salvador. The water filters will help to rid the drinking water of several contaminants which will help reduce the risk of contracting intestinal infections due to drinking contaminated water.

Dr. John O'Brien has been attending the San Cristóbal de las Casas, Chiapas mission for four consecutive years supported by Dr. Erik Meidl from New London, MO. Dr. O'Brien looks forward to the opportunity to be the preceptor to five Physician's Assistant students from SUNY Upstate Medical University in Syracuse, New York in June of 2018.

In 2017, we were blessed with a new mission site in Zapatón-Puriscal, Costa Rica. This area is located on the west coast of the country. Some of the issues the people of the area are dealing with are skin diseases and respiratory and gastrointestinal infections. Fr. Thanh Nguyen, LC. has been a great help to both the missionaries and the locals through his priestly ministry by offering confession, counseling, and pastoral leadership.

Our team from the Laredo, TX region, led by Dr. Sonia Soriano, expanded their services by also providing the same water filters from EcoFiltro to the people of Copainalá, Chiapas.

Prior to the devastating floods in Houston, the team organized yet another huge shipping effort to bring much needed equipment and supplies to San Salvador, El Salvador to be used by our local Parish based clinics. We thank Christine Hunter, Diana Janssens and Dr. Ron Taylor for their leadership in spite of the challenges.

The St Louis, MO mission team, led by Dr. Peter Danis, launched a successful fundraiser this year in order to help the missionaries going to Santiago Texacuangos, El Salvador to pay part of the mission fee. We hope the team continues with the infectious missionary spirit.

Our team with members from Colorado and Connecticut were instrumental in bringing a new program supporting the local Catholic School and bringing water to the town of Santa Maria de Jesus, Guatemala. Dr. Michael Brezinsky and Ellen Miller have led this effort for eleven years now.

Overall, I am happy to report it has been another grace filled year for HHMM. I am thankful to all our missionaries, for their sacrifices and heartfelt efforts in bringing compassionate care and the Gospel to our poorest brothers and sisters. I am looking forward, by the grace of God, to continuing to bring compassionate healthcare to those most in need in 2018.

Special Projects

Helping Hands Missionaries, lead by Dr. Michael Brezinsky participated in another successful mission to Santa Maria de Jesus in Guatemala. Over the course of five days, the medical staff treated and managed care for over 2,000 patients.

Our Water Filter team, including a representative of EcoFiltro, Ellen Miller and Maura O'Connor, distributed 320 filters during our five clinical days. We educated local families on the importance of clean drinking water and emphasized the proper use and care of these new filters to maximize their longevity. According to our 2016 family census, our filter distribution this year directly affected the lives of approximately 2,000 people.

We like this product because it has less moving parts and is produced in Guatemala. In addition, EcoFiltro is owned by a Guatemalan who supports our mission.

Following the suggestion of EcoFiltro, we charged a nominal fee of 20Q or \$3 USD for each filter. The charge was well received and we expect it will help instill a sense of pride of ownership by the filter recipients.
